

A Few Christian Evangelical Voices Opposing Zionism

Christian Zionism, a movement rooted in theological and political support for the modern state of Israel, has long held a prominent position in U.S. evangelical Christianity. For many evangelicals, this perspective is seen as a fulfillment of biblical prophecy and a spiritual obligation. However, not all evangelicals agree with this interpretation. A growing number of dissenting voices within the community challenge Christian Zionism on theological, ethical, and political grounds, arguing that it often prioritizes geopolitical agendas over the gospel's call to justice, peace, and reconciliation. This paper highlights a few of these voices, exploring how their perspectives provide an alternative narrative that seeks to align evangelical Christianity more closely with the teachings of Jesus. By emphasizing justice for Palestinians, fostering reconciliation between communities, and critiquing the political implications of uncritical support for Israel, these voices invite a deeper and more nuanced understanding of evangelical engagement in the Middle East. Their work serves as a call to rethink assumptions, broaden perspectives, and pursue peace rooted in gospel principles.

Introduction

Christian Zionism is a theological and political movement that supports the establishment and ongoing existence of the modern state of Israel as a fulfillment of biblical prophecy. This belief often extends to viewing the return of Jews to their ancestral homeland as a divinely ordained event that signals the unfolding of eschatological (end-times) prophecy. For many Christian Zionists, support for Israel is not only a political stance but also a spiritual imperative, seen as aligning with God's plan for the world.

Within U.S. evangelical Christianity, Christian Zionism is highly prevalent. This is due in part to the influence of dispensationalist theology, which divides history into distinct eras, or "dispensations," and assigns a unique role to the Jewish people and the state of Israel in God's redemptive plan. Organizations such as Christians United for Israel (CUFI) have mobilized millions of evangelicals, blending theological support for Israel with political advocacy. This movement has significantly shaped U.S. foreign policy in the Middle East and deepened the bond between evangelical Christians and the Jewish state.

However, despite the widespread acceptance of Christian Zionism within evangelical circles, there exists a smaller but notable contingent of dissenting voices. These evangelicals challenge Christian Zionism on theological, ethical, and political grounds. They argue that the movement distorts the gospel by prioritizing geopolitical concerns over Christ's universal message of salvation and peace. These critics also raise concerns about the impact of Zionism on justice and human rights, particularly regarding Palestinian Christians and Muslims who are often marginalized in mainstream narratives.

This paper aims to shed light on these dissenting voices by highlighting specific evangelical leaders and movements that critique Christian Zionism. By exploring their theological arguments, ethical concerns, and political critiques, the paper seeks to provide a nuanced understanding of the diversity of thought within evangelical Christianity on this issue. These alternative perspectives offer a framework for rethinking the relationship between faith, politics, and justice in the context of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Through their work, these leaders

and movements challenge evangelicals to prioritize reconciliation, compassion, and a Christ-centered approach in their engagement with the Holy Land.

2. The Theological Opposition

Theological critiques of Christian Zionism among evangelicals center on reinterpreting scripture, emphasizing the universal nature of the gospel, and addressing perceived inconsistencies between Christian Zionist ideology and the teachings of Jesus. These critiques reflect a range of perspectives, from nuanced adjustments to mainstream evangelical theology to outright rejection of Christian Zionism's foundational assumptions. This section highlights prominent evangelical figures who challenge Christian Zionism from a theological standpoint and underscores the diversity of these critiques.

John Piper: Reinterpreting Israel's Role in God's Plan

John Piper, a renowned evangelical pastor and theologian, provides a nuanced critique of Christian Zionism by emphasizing the spiritual fulfillment of biblical promises to Israel. While Piper affirms the historical and spiritual significance of Israel in God's redemptive plan, he challenges the idea that the modern state of Israel is the ultimate fulfillment of these promises. Instead, Piper argues that the Church—comprising believers from all nations—represents the true continuation of Israel in the New Covenant.

Piper's perspective is rooted in a Christocentric interpretation of scripture, where Jesus' life, death, and resurrection fulfill the Old Testament promises to Israel. This approach shifts the focus from geopolitical restoration to the global and spiritual mission of the Church. Piper warns against conflating contemporary political developments with divine prophecy, cautioning evangelicals to prioritize the gospel's universal call over nationalistic or territorial concerns.

Tony Campolo: Advocating for a Universal Gospel

Tony Campolo, an influential evangelical leader and advocate for social justice, critiques Christian Zionism for narrowing the scope of the gospel to a specific geopolitical agenda. Campolo emphasizes the universal nature of Christ's message, which transcends national boundaries and ethnic divisions. He argues that focusing excessively on the modern state of Israel risks sidelining the core Christian mission of sharing the gospel and addressing global injustices.

Campolo's critique is particularly directed at the exclusivity of Christian Zionist theology, which often prioritizes the Jewish people and the land of Israel above other aspects of God's creation. Instead, he calls for an evangelical faith that champions reconciliation, peace, and justice for all people, including Palestinians. For Campolo, the gospel's power lies in its ability to unite rather than divide, making the emphasis on a single nation's destiny incompatible with Christ's teachings.

Naim Ateek: Critiquing Zionism Through Liberation Theology

Naim Ateek, a Palestinian Anglican priest and founder of the Sabeel Ecumenical Liberation Theology Center, offers one of the most pointed theological critiques of Christian Zionism. Ateek frames his opposition to Zionism through the lens of liberation theology, emphasizing justice, equality, and the defense of the oppressed. He argues that Christian Zionism distorts the teachings of Jesus by aligning with policies and ideologies that perpetuate inequality and suffering, particularly for Palestinians.

Ateek's theological critique is rooted in the message of Jesus as a liberator, whose ministry focused on uplifting the marginalized and challenging systems of oppression. He views Zionism, as it is implemented politically, as incompatible with this vision, particularly in its treatment of Palestinian Christians and Muslims. In his writings, such as *Justice and Only Justice: A Palestinian Theology of Liberation*, Ateek challenges evangelicals to consider how their support for Zionism aligns with or contradicts the gospel's call for justice and mercy.

Highlighting the Diversity of Theological Critiques

The critiques of Piper, Campolo, and Ateek reflect the diversity of theological opposition to Christian Zionism within evangelical Christianity. These perspectives span a wide range of theological frameworks, including:

1. **Supersessionism (Replacement Theology):** The belief that the Church has replaced Israel as the recipient of God's promises. While controversial, this view underpins many critiques of Christian Zionism by shifting the focus from Israel to the global body of Christ.
2. **Non-Dispensational Interpretations:** Challenges to the dispensationalist framework that undergirds Christian Zionism. These critiques argue for a less literal and more spiritual interpretation of biblical prophecy, prioritizing the gospel's universal mission over territorial concerns.
3. **Liberation Theology:** A focus on the ethical implications of Christian Zionism, particularly its impact on justice, human rights, and reconciliation.

These diverse theological perspectives share a common thread: a call to re-center evangelical faith on the teachings of Jesus and the global mission of the Church. By challenging Christian Zionism's emphasis on political and territorial concerns, these voices encourage a broader, more inclusive understanding of God's plan that prioritizes justice, reconciliation, and the universal message of the gospel.

3. Ethical Concerns and the Call for Justice

A central critique of Christian Zionism among evangelical dissenters is its ethical implications, particularly regarding its impact on Palestinians. These critics argue that the movement often overlooks or exacerbates injustices faced by Palestinian Christians and Muslims, raising profound questions about the alignment of Christian Zionism with the gospel's emphasis on justice, mercy, and reconciliation. By addressing these concerns, evangelical voices like Gary Burge and Shane Claiborne challenge their communities to reconsider the ethical dimensions of their support for Zionism.

Palestinian Rights: The Impact of Zionism on Palestinian Christians and Muslims

The political implementation of Zionism, supported by many Christian Zionists, has significant consequences for Palestinians, including widespread displacement, human rights violations, and systemic inequality. Palestinian Christians, who have maintained a continuous presence in the Holy Land since the time of Christ, often find themselves marginalized in both the geopolitical conflict and Christian Zionist narratives. As a result, their voices are frequently ignored in discussions about the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Critics of Christian Zionism argue that an uncritical focus on the state of Israel ignores the struggles of Palestinian communities, undermining the gospel's call to defend the oppressed and seek justice for all. Palestinian Christians, in particular, feel doubly marginalized—both as Palestinians living under occupation and as Christians excluded from the evangelical narrative. This exclusion raises questions about the consistency of Christian Zionism with Jesus' teachings on loving one's neighbor and caring for the least of these.

Gary Burge: Advocating for Justice Through His Work on Palestinian Christians

Gary Burge, a theologian and New Testament scholar, has been a leading voice in highlighting the struggles of Palestinian Christians. In his book *Whose Land? Whose Promise? What Christians Are Not Being Told About Israel and the Palestinians*, Burge confronts the ethical blind spots of Christian Zionism, particularly its neglect of Palestinian perspectives. He argues that the Church has a responsibility to address the injustices faced by Palestinian Christians and advocate for their dignity and rights.

Burge's work draws attention to the human cost of Christian Zionism, challenging evangelicals to move beyond theological abstractions and engage with the lived realities of those affected by the conflict. He emphasizes that justice is not optional for Christians—it is a core element of discipleship. By advocating for a more balanced approach, Burge encourages evangelicals to consider how their support for Israel can coexist with a commitment to justice for Palestinians.

Shane Claiborne: Emphasizing Nonviolence and Justice Over Political Allegiances

Shane Claiborne, an evangelical activist and author, critiques Christian Zionism from the perspective of nonviolence and social justice. He argues that the gospel calls Christians to be peacemakers, not partisans in geopolitical conflicts.

Claiborne has spoken out against the militarization of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict and the ways in which Christian Zionism can align with policies that perpetuate violence and inequality.

For Claiborne, the gospel's emphasis on nonviolence and justice requires a radical rethinking of evangelical engagement with the Middle East. He calls on Christians to prioritize relationships with both Israelis and Palestinians, seeking to understand their experiences and advocate for peace. Claiborne's vision is rooted in Jesus' teachings, which emphasize love, mercy, and reconciliation as the foundation of Christian life.

The Role of Jesus' Teachings in Inspiring Justice, Mercy, and Reconciliation

At the heart of the ethical critiques of Christian Zionism is a return to the teachings of Jesus, who consistently prioritized justice and mercy over political or nationalistic concerns. In the Gospels, Jesus' ministry was marked by a focus on the marginalized, including those who were oppressed by political and religious systems. He called his followers to love their enemies, forgive those who wrong them, and seek peace at all costs.

Critics of Christian Zionism argue that its support for policies that harm Palestinians, whether intentionally or as an unintended consequence, is inconsistent with Jesus' teachings. The gospel calls for a radical commitment to justice and reconciliation, requiring Christians to advocate for the dignity and well-being of all people, regardless of their ethnicity or nationality.

Conclusion

The ethical concerns raised by critics of Christian Zionism reflect a deep commitment to the gospel's call for justice, mercy, and reconciliation. By focusing on the experiences of Palestinian Christians and Muslims, voices like Gary Burge

and Shane Claiborne challenge evangelicals to rethink their approach to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Their critiques remind the Church that the gospel's transformative power lies in its ability to heal divisions, uplift the oppressed, and bring peace to even the most intractable conflicts. These voices serve as a call to action for evangelicals to align their faith with the ethical imperatives of Jesus' teachings.

4. Political Critiques of Zionism

Political critiques of Christian Zionism within evangelical Christianity focus on its influence on U.S. foreign policy, its contribution to regional instability, and its impact on peace and reconciliation efforts. Critics highlight how uncritical support for Israel often aligns with militaristic strategies, exacerbates tensions in the Middle East, and marginalizes the pursuit of justice and peace for all parties. Evangelical leaders like Jim Wallis and Lynne Hybels have emerged as key voices calling for a more balanced, ethical approach to engaging with the Israeli-Palestinian conflict.

Jim Wallis: Critiquing the Militaristic Implications of Christian Zionism on U.S. Foreign Policy

Jim Wallis, founder of *Sojourners* and a prominent evangelical advocate for social justice, has been a vocal critic of Christian Zionism's influence on U.S. foreign policy. Wallis argues that Christian Zionism often aligns with militaristic approaches to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, prioritizing the defense of Israeli territorial interests over efforts to promote peace and reconciliation. This alignment, Wallis contends, undermines the gospel's call for peacemaking and fosters cycles of violence and oppression.

Wallis critiques the narrative that equates unconditional support for Israel with biblical faithfulness, warning that this approach can lead to policies that ignore or even exacerbate human suffering. He emphasizes that U.S. foreign policy, informed by Christian Zionism, has often sidelined diplomatic solutions in favor of military alliances and actions, contributing to instability in the Middle East. For

Wallis, true Christian engagement with the conflict must prioritize the gospel's message of peace and justice over geopolitical strategies.

Lynne Hybels: Advocating for a Balanced Approach to the Israeli-Palestinian Conflict

Lynne Hybels, co-founder of Willow Creek Community Church, has emerged as a leading evangelical voice advocating for a more balanced and compassionate approach to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Hybels critiques the uncritical alignment of many evangelicals with Israeli policies, arguing that this stance often neglects the experiences and rights of Palestinians. She emphasizes that both Israelis and Palestinians deserve justice, security, and dignity, and that the Church has a moral responsibility to advocate for both communities.

Hybels has been actively involved in peacebuilding initiatives in the region, partnering with organizations that work toward reconciliation and mutual understanding. Her advocacy highlights the importance of listening to diverse perspectives, including those of Palestinian Christians and Muslims, and resisting the tendency to oversimplify the conflict into binary narratives. By promoting dialogue and empathy, Hybels challenges evangelicals to move beyond partisan allegiances and embrace a Christ-centered vision of justice and peace.

Exploring the Unintended Consequences of Uncritical Evangelical Support for Israel

Uncritical evangelical support for Israel, driven by Christian Zionist theology, has had several unintended consequences that undermine efforts toward peace and reconciliation. These consequences include:

1. **Escalating Tensions in the Middle East:** Evangelical support for policies that prioritize Israeli sovereignty often exacerbates existing tensions in the region. This includes the displacement of Palestinians, the expansion of settlements in the West Bank, and restrictions on Palestinian movement and access to resources. Such policies fuel resentment and hinder the possibility of a two-state solution or other pathways to peace.

2. **Sidelining Reconciliation Efforts:** By aligning with one side of the conflict, Christian Zionism risks marginalizing peacebuilding initiatives that seek to address the needs and rights of both Israelis and Palestinians. The focus on supporting Israel's political and territorial ambitions often overshadows efforts to promote dialogue, mutual understanding, and compromise.
3. **Undermining U.S. Credibility as a Mediator:** The perception that U.S. foreign policy is disproportionately influenced by Christian Zionist theology can weaken America's role as an impartial mediator in the conflict. This bias reduces the likelihood of meaningful negotiations and alienates other stakeholders in the region.
4. **Polarizing Evangelical Communities:** Within evangelical Christianity, uncritical support for Israel has created divisions between those who prioritize Zionism and those who advocate for a more justice-oriented approach. This polarization reflects broader tensions within the Church about how to interpret scripture and engage with political issues.

Conclusion

The political critiques of Christian Zionism by leaders like Jim Wallis and Lynne Hybels underscore the importance of rethinking evangelical engagement with the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. By emphasizing the need for justice, peace, and reconciliation, these voices challenge the Church to move beyond narrow allegiances and embrace a more balanced and ethical approach. Christ at the Checkpoint (CATC) is a biennial conference held in Bethlehem that brings together Christians from around the world to discuss the theological, ethical, and political dimensions of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Organized by Palestinian Christian leaders, the conference provides a platform for dialogue, reflection, and advocacy, challenging Christian Zionism and promoting a justice-oriented approach to the conflict.

The name “Christ at the Checkpoint” refers to the physical checkpoints that restrict the movement of Palestinians in the West Bank, symbolizing the broader issues of occupation, inequality, and human rights violations. The conference emphasizes the centrality of Jesus’ teachings in addressing these issues, calling Christians to follow his example of love, compassion, and justice.

Key themes of CATC include:

- **Challenging Christian Zionism:** The conference critiques the theological underpinnings of Christian Zionism, arguing that it often ignores the lived realities of Palestinian Christians and Muslims.
- **Promoting Reconciliation:** CATC emphasizes the need for mutual understanding and dialogue between Israelis and Palestinians, advocating for peacebuilding initiatives that respect the dignity of all people.
- **Highlighting Palestinian Voices:** By centering the experiences of Palestinian Christians, the conference seeks to correct the narrative imbalance in evangelical discussions of the conflict.

CATC has faced criticism from some Christian Zionists, who view it as anti-Israel, but its organizers maintain that their goal is not to oppose Israel but to advocate for justice, peace, and the gospel's message of reconciliation.
