1. "The Protocols of the Elders of Zion" (1903)

- **Author:** Unknown (Often attributed to various individuals, but most likely fabricated by the Tsarist secret police)
- **Overview:** One of the most infamous and widely distributed anti-Semitic texts, falsely claiming to reveal a Jewish plan for global domination. Though long debunked, it has had a significant influence on anti-Zionist and anti-Semitic thought.
- **Controversy:** Promotes conspiracy theories about Jewish global control.

2. "The International Jew: The World's Foremost Problem" (1920)

- **Author:** Henry Ford (published in his newspaper *The Dearborn Independent*)
- **Overview:** A series of articles that were later compiled into a book, alleging Jewish control over international finance and media. Ford drew on *The Protocols of the Elders of Zion* and other anti-Semitic tropes.
- **Controversy:** Criticized for promoting hatred towards Jews and perpetuating stereotypes.

3. "Germany Must Perish!" (1941)

- **Author:** Theodore N. Kaufman
- **Overview:** Although written by a Jewish author, this work called for the sterilization of Germans to prevent future wars. Its sensational and extreme ideas were used by the Nazis as proof of supposed Jewish plans for genocide against Germans.
- **Controversy:** Nazis exploited the book as anti-Zionist propaganda despite its author's minority position within Jewish thought.

4. "Zionism: The Real Enemy of the Jews" (2005)

- **Author:** Alan Hart
- **Overview:** Hart criticizes Zionism and the creation of Israel, asserting that the movement is responsible for much of the tension and violence in the

Middle East. He distinguishes between Judaism and Zionism, arguing that the latter is detrimental to Jews.

- **Controversy:** Considered by critics to be deeply anti-Zionist and revisionist, with accusations of anti-Semitic implications.

5. "The Thirteenth Tribe: The Khazar Empire and Its Heritage" (1976)

- **Author:** Arthur Koestler
- **Overview:** Koestler argues that modern-day Ashkenazi Jews are descended from the Khazars, a Turkic people who converted to Judaism in the Middle Ages, rather than from the ancient Israelites. This book has been used to delegitimize the Jewish connection to Israel.
- **Controversy:** Though not directly anti-Zionist, it has been co-opted by anti-Zionist and anti-Semitic groups to claim that Jews have no historical claim to the land of Israel.

6. "The Jewish Revolutionary Spirit and Its Impact on World History" (2008)

- **Author:** E. Michael Jones
- **Overview:** This book suggests that Jews have historically sought to subvert Christian civilization and have been involved in various revolutions throughout history to undermine societal stability.
- **Controversy:** Often accused of being anti-Semitic and revisionist, with its critique of Zionism closely linked to traditional anti-Jewish narratives.

7. "Ben-Gurion's Scandals: How the Haganah and the Mossad Eliminated Jews" (2000)

- **Author:** Naeim Giladi
- **Overview:** Giladi, an Iraqi Jew, claims in this book that early Zionist leaders, including David Ben-Gurion, were involved in the suppression or elimination of Jews who did not align with their vision, particularly Jews from Arab lands.

- **Controversy:** Controversial for its harsh critique of the Israeli state and Zionist leadership, the book has been criticized for alleged inaccuracies and promoting fringe conspiracy theories.

8. "The Transfer Agreement: The Dramatic Story of the Pact Between the Third Reich and Jewish Palestine" (1984)

- **Author:** Edwin Black
- **Overview:** Black recounts an agreement between Nazi Germany and Zionist organizations in the 1930s, which allowed Jews to emigrate to Palestine in exchange for transferring assets. Though the book is factual, it has been used by some to criticize Zionism's early leadership.
- **Controversy:** While not inherently anti-Zionist, some have cited this work to argue that Zionist leaders collaborated with the Nazis, fueling conspiracy theories.

9. "The Controversy of Zion" (1956, published posthumously in 1985)

- **Author:** Douglas Reed
- **Overview:** Reed, a British journalist, explores Zionism's role in global politics, alleging a vast conspiracy involving Jewish elites. He critiques the establishment of Israel and Zionism's influence over Western nations.
- **Controversy:** Accused of anti-Semitism and conspiracy-mongering for its portrayal of Zionism as a sinister force in global affairs.

10. "Final Judgement: The Missing Link in the JFK Assassination Conspiracy" (1995)

- **Author:** Michael Collins Piper
- **Overview:** Piper alleges that Israeli intelligence (Mossad) was involved in the assassination of John F. Kennedy due to disagreements over nuclear policy. This book links the JFK assassination to Zionist interests.
- **Controversy:** Widely dismissed as a fringe conspiracy theory and heavily criticized for its anti-Zionist and anti-Semitic overtones.

11. "By Way of Deception: The Making and Unmaking of a Mossad Officer" (1990)

- **Author:** Victor Ostrovsky
- **Overview:** Ostrovsky, a former Mossad officer, provides an insider account of the operations of Israeli intelligence. He alleges that Mossad engages in deceptive tactics to achieve Israel's geopolitical goals.
- **Controversy:** The Israeli government tried to prevent the book's publication. It has been criticized for being anti-Zionist and for exaggerating Israel's global influence, though Ostrovsky claims it is simply exposing the truth.

12. "The Hidden History of Zionism" (1988)

- **Author:** Ralph Schoenman
- **Overview:** Schoenman argues that Zionism, from its inception, has been a colonial project designed to displace Palestinians and create a Jewish supremacist state in the Middle East. He views Zionism as inherently racist and imperialist.
- **Controversy:** Criticized for being highly polemical and promoting extreme anti-Zionist views, it's widely considered controversial for its harsh portrayal of Israeli policies.

13. "They Dare to Speak Out: People and Institutions Confront Israel's Lobby" (1985)

- **Author:** Paul Findley
- **Overview:** Former U.S. Congressman Paul Findley explores the power and influence of the pro-Israel lobby in the United States, particularly AIPAC, and how it affects U.S. foreign policy.
- **Controversy:** The book is often cited as a significant anti-Zionist work due to its critique of Zionism's influence in American politics, with some accusing it of stoking anti-Semitism by blaming Jews for U.S. political decisions.

14. "The Israel Lobby and U.S. Foreign Policy" (2007)

- **Authors:** John Mearsheimer and Stephen Walt
- **Overview:** Mearsheimer and Walt argue that the Israel lobby in the U.S. has an undue influence on American foreign policy, often to the detriment of U.S. national interests. They also argue that U.S. support for Israel exacerbates anti-American sentiment in the Middle East.
- **Controversy:** While the authors deny any anti-Semitic intent, the book has been condemned by many as promoting anti-Zionist and potentially anti-Semitic ideas, as it suggests that Zionist interests drive U.S. policy in a detrimental way.

15. "The Holocaust Industry: Reflections on the Exploitation of Jewish Suffering" (2000)

- **Author:** Norman Finkelstein
- **Overview:** Finkelstein argues that Jewish organizations and the state of Israel have exploited the Holocaust for financial gain and political leverage. He is highly critical of what he views as the commercialization and politicization of Holocaust memory.
- **Controversy:** The book has been called anti-Semitic and anti-Zionist by its critics, who argue that Finkelstein's rhetoric and conclusions trivialize the Holocaust and promote divisive ideas.

16. "Jewish History, Jewish Religion: The Weight of Three Thousand Years" (1994)

- **Author:** Israel Shahak
- **Overview:** Shahak, an Israeli professor and Holocaust survivor, critiques the role of religious Zionism in Israeli politics, and the relationship between religious Jewish law and the state. He argues that religious Zionism fosters a form of Jewish exclusivism.
- **Controversy:** Shahak's work has been criticized for presenting a distorted view of Judaism and Israeli society, often seen as fueling anti-Zionist rhetoric with his harsh criticisms of Israel.

17. "The Wandering Who?: A Study of Jewish Identity Politics" (2011)

- **Author:** Gilad Atzmon
- **Overview:** Atzmon, a former Israeli, explores Jewish identity and questions the relationship between Jewish identity politics and Zionism. He argues that Jewishness itself, as a form of identity, can foster support for Zionism and is inherently exclusionary.
- **Controversy:** Widely condemned as anti-Semitic, with critics arguing that Atzmon's critique of Zionism crosses the line into broader attacks on Jewish identity, not just political Zionism.

18. "Against Our Better Judgment: The Hidden History of How the U.S. Was Used to Create Israel" (2014)

- **Author:** Alison Weir
- **Overview:** Weir argues that U.S. foreign policy, particularly around the creation of Israel, was manipulated by Zionist forces in ways that were detrimental to American interests. She contends that the U.S. was instrumentalized in the creation and ongoing support of Israel.
- **Controversy:** Critics of the book accuse Weir of promoting anti-Zionist conspiracy theories and portraying Israel as an illegitimate state built on manipulation of U.S. foreign policy.

19. "State of Terror: How Terrorism Created Modern Israel" (2016)

- **Author:** Thomas Suárez
- **Overview:** Suárez examines the role of Jewish paramilitary organizations, such as the Irgun and Lehi, in the establishment of Israel, arguing that their tactics amounted to terrorism. He suggests that Israel was born out of violence and continues to employ similar methods.
- **Controversy:** Accused of being one-sided, the book has been criticized for portraying Zionist movements as synonymous with terrorism and for demonizing the state of Israel.

20. "Israel's Sacred Terrorism" (1980)

- **Author:** Livia Rokach
- **Overview:** Based on the diaries of Israeli Prime Minister Moshe Sharett, Rokach argues that the Israeli government systematically used terror tactics, not just to achieve its independence but also to maintain and expand its control over Palestinian territories.
- **Controversy:** The book is controversial for portraying Israel as a state that relies on fear and intimidation, rather than diplomacy or legitimate governance, often labeled as anti-Zionist propaganda.

21. "The Hidden Hand: Middle East Fears of Conspiracy" (1996)

- **Author:** Daniel Pipes
- **Overview:** Although Pipes himself is pro-Israel, this book surveys the prevalence of conspiracy theories in the Arab world, many of which are anti-Zionist. It documents how various Arab intellectuals, politicians, and journalists have fostered anti-Zionist and anti-Semitic conspiracy theories to explain regional events.
- **Controversy:** Pipes' work has been criticized for reinforcing stereotypes about Arabs as conspiracy-obsessed, while also documenting the real impact of anti-Zionist narratives in the region.

22. "Palestine: Peace Not Apartheid" (2006)

- **Author:** Jimmy Carter
- **Overview:** Former U.S. President Jimmy Carter critiques Israeli policies towards Palestinians, particularly in the occupied territories. He compares Israel's actions to apartheid-era South Africa and calls for peace negotiations that respect Palestinian rights.
- **Controversy:** While Carter insists the book is not anti-Semitic, it has been labeled as such by pro-Zionist groups, who argue that it unfairly singles out Israel and damages its global reputation.

23. "Overcoming Zionism: Creating a Single Democratic State in Israel/Palestine" (2007)

- **Author:** Joel Kovel
- **Overview:** Kovel advocates for the dissolution of the Jewish state of Israel in favor of a single, democratic state that includes both Jews and Palestinians. He argues that Zionism is an inherently racist ideology that can't coexist with true democracy.
- **Controversy:** The book was banned by some U.S. distributors for promoting what they viewed as extremist anti-Zionist views, but was praised by others in the Palestinian solidarity movement.

24. "The Fateful Triangle: The United States, Israel, and the Palestinians" (1983)

- **Author:** Noam Chomsky
- **Overview:** Chomsky examines U.S.-Israeli relations and Israel's treatment of Palestinians, presenting a strong critique of Israeli policies and U.S. support for them. He is particularly harsh on Israel's actions during the 1982 Lebanon War.
- **Controversy:** While Chomsky denies being anti-Semitic, his criticism of Israel's policies has led to accusations of anti-Zionism and being overly sympathetic to Palestinian militant groups.

25. "Our Harsh Logic: Israeli Soldiers' Testimonies from the Occupied Territories, 2000-2010" (2012)

- **Authors:** Breaking the Silence (Israeli NGO)
- **Overview:** This book presents testimonies from Israeli soldiers detailing their experiences in the occupied Palestinian territories, often recounting human rights abuses and mistreatment of Palestinians.
- **Controversy:** Supporters of Israel have labeled the book anti-Zionist for portraying the Israeli military as systematically abusive. The Israeli government and military have accused *Breaking the Silence* of slander.

26. "The Invention of the Jewish People" (2008)

- **Author:** Shlomo Sand
- **Overview:** Sand argues that the concept of a unified Jewish people with a common origin is a modern invention, fabricated by Zionist ideologues. He claims that much of Jewish history was constructed to legitimize the establishment of the Israeli state.
- **Controversy:** While praised by some as a bold reevaluation of Jewish history, the book has been criticized for undermining Jewish identity and promoting anti-Zionist rhetoric.

27. "The Ethnic Cleansing of Palestine" (2006)

- **Author:** Ilan Pappé
- **Overview:** Pappé, an Israeli historian, contends that the establishment of Israel involved the deliberate and systematic expulsion of Palestinians from their homes in 1948. He refers to this as ethnic cleansing.
- **Controversy:** This book sparked heated debate, with some accusing Pappé of distorting history and being a traitor to his nation, while others saw it as a courageous critique of Israel's founding.

28. "Blowing the Whistle on Genocide: The Story of an Israeli Whistleblower" (2000)

- **Author:** Mordechai Vanunu
- **Overview:** Vanunu, an Israeli nuclear technician, exposed Israel's nuclear weapons program to the international press in the 1980s. In this book, he shares his story and critiques Israeli policies.
- **Controversy:** While celebrated by anti-nuclear advocates and critics of Israel, Vanunu's revelations were seen as a betrayal by the Israeli government, and his work is regarded as anti-Zionist by some for challenging Israel's security policies.

29. "Israel: A Colonial-Settler State?" (1979)

- **Author:** Maxime Rodinson
- **Overview:** Rodinson, a French Marxist historian, views Israel as a settler-colonial state imposed by Western powers to maintain dominance in the Middle East. He argues that Zionism is akin to other colonialist movements in history.
- **Controversy:** This book is frequently cited in debates about Zionism, with critics accusing Rodinson of delegitimizing Israel's right to exist.

30. "The Hidden History of How America Was Used to Create Israel" (2014)

- **Author:** Alison Weir
- **Overview:** This book argues that Zionist elites manipulated the U.S. government into supporting the creation of Israel, often against the interests of the American people.
- **Controversy:** Weir's work is often viewed as promoting anti-Semitic and anti-Zionist conspiracy theories, though she maintains it is a critical historical account of U.S.-Israeli relations.

31. "A History of Zionism: From the French Revolution to the Establishment of the State of Israel" (1972)

- **Author:** Walter Laqueur
- **Overview:** Laqueur offers a detailed history of the Zionist movement, charting its origins in Europe and the eventual establishment of Israel. While Laqueur is more objective than many on this list, his work is still considered controversial for touching on Zionism's colonial aspects.
- **Controversy:** Some anti-Zionist critics see the book as an apologetic defense of Zionism, while others accuse it of downplaying the impact of Zionism on Palestinians.

32. "One Palestine, Complete: Jews and Arabs under the British Mandate" (1999)

- **Author:** Tom Segev
- **Overview:** Segev examines the British Mandate period in Palestine and its role in laying the groundwork for the eventual Israeli-Palestinian conflict. He critiques both Jewish and British policies during this period.
- **Controversy:** While not outright anti-Zionist, the book has been criticized for questioning some of the moral foundations of the Israeli state.

33. "State of Siege: Israel's Economic Warfare Against Gaza" (2016)

- **Author:** Richard Falk
- **Overview:** Falk, a UN Special Rapporteur on Palestinian human rights, discusses the blockade of Gaza and accuses Israel of using economic warfare to subjugate the Palestinian population.
- **Controversy:** Falk's work is seen by many as a harsh critique of Israel and its policies, while others claim he is anti-Zionist and overly sympathetic to Palestinian militants.

34. "War for Eternity: The Return of Traditionalism and the Rise of the Populist Right" (2020)

- **Author:** Benjamin Teitelbaum
- **Overview:** Although not explicitly anti-Zionist, this book explores how some traditionalist thinkers view Zionism as part of a modernist, globalist conspiracy. It discusses how far-right leaders, including those with anti-Zionist views, use traditionalist ideology to fuel their political movements.
- **Controversy:** The book has drawn criticism from both supporters and detractors of traditionalist ideologies for its exploration of far-right anti-Zionist ideas.

35. "The Myths of Zionism" (2004)

- **Overview:** Rose argues that Zionism has built its narrative on myths, including the notion that Jews have an unbroken link to the land of Israel. He contends that these myths have been used to justify the displacement of Palestinians.
- **Controversy:** Rose has been criticized for delegitimizing the Jewish connection to Israel and for presenting a one-sided, anti-Zionist narrative.

36. "The Origin of the Palestine-Israel Conflict" (2001)

- **Author:** Jews for Justice in the Middle East (JFJME)
- **Overview:** This pamphlet/booklet, produced by a Jewish anti-Zionist organization, seeks to document the Zionist role in the displacement and suffering of Palestinians, particularly focusing on the 1948 Nakba (disaster).
- **Controversy:** JFJME's work is highly controversial within the Jewish community, with many seeing it as overly critical of Zionism and promoting a narrative that erases Jewish suffering.

37. "Palestine: A Four Thousand Year History" (2018)

- **Author:** Nur Masalha
- **Overview:** Masalha, a Palestinian historian, presents a long history of Palestine, emphasizing its multi-ethnic and multi-religious past. He argues that Zionism has rewritten Palestinian history to suit its political objectives.
- **Controversy:** This book has been both praised and criticized for presenting a version of Palestinian history that runs counter to Zionist narratives, with critics accusing Masalha of rewriting history to undermine Israel's legitimacy.

38. "Arabs and Jews in Ottoman Palestine: Two Worlds Collide" (2013)

- **Author:** Alan Dowty
- **Overview:** Dowty explores the complex relationships between Jews and Arabs in Palestine during the Ottoman Empire. The book suggests that the roots of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict can be traced back to this era.
- **Controversy:** Although not directly anti-Zionist, it has sparked debate for suggesting that Zionism's emergence worsened relations between Jews and Arabs in the region.

39. "The Iron Wall: Israel and the Arab World" (1999)

- **Author:** Avi Shlaim
- **Overview:** Shlaim offers a revisionist history of Israeli relations with the Arab world, arguing that Israel has consistently used military force and an "iron wall" strategy to deal with its neighbors, rather than seeking genuine peace.
- **Controversy:** Though Shlaim is considered part of the "new historians" in Israel, his critical stance toward Israeli policies, particularly his view of Zionism as belligerent, has sparked controversy.

40. "Goliath: Life and Loathing in Greater Israel" (2013)

- **Author:** Max Blumenthal
- **Overview:** Blumenthal offers a harsh critique of Israeli society, focusing on its treatment of Palestinians and internal racism. He paints a grim picture of Israeli nationalism and its impacts on both Israeli and Palestinian lives.
- **Controversy:** This book has been highly controversial, with accusations that it is not only anti-Zionist but also anti-Semitic. Blumenthal's harsh critique of Israeli policies and society has sparked significant debate.

41. "Defending the Holy Land: A Critical Analysis of Israel's Security & Foreign Policy" (2006)

- **Author:** Zeev Maoz
- **Overview:** Maoz, an Israeli political scientist, critiques Israel's security and foreign policies, arguing that they have often been counterproductive and have worsened relations with neighboring countries.
- **Controversy:** Though Maoz is critical of Zionist policies, he does not question the legitimacy of Israel itself. Still, his critique of Israeli military and political strategies is seen by some as providing fodder for anti-Zionist arguments.

42. "The Oslo Syndrome: Delusions of a People under Siege" (2005)

- **Author:** Kenneth Levin
- **Overview:** Levin explores the psychological impact of Zionism and conflict on Israelis, arguing that some Israelis have adopted a "siege mentality" or even self-blame, contributing to the failures of the peace process.
- **Controversy:** Levin's critique of Israelis who blame themselves for conflict is considered controversial, especially among more liberal or anti-Zionist commentators, who accuse him of dismissing legitimate critiques of Israeli policies.

43. "Israel's Sacred Terrorism: A Study Based on Moshe Sharett's Personal Diary and Other Documents" (1980)

- **Author:** Livia Rokach
- **Overview:** This book uses former Israeli Prime Minister Moshe Sharett's diary to argue that Israel used terrorism and fear tactics to solidify its control over Palestine and manipulate its neighbors.
- **Controversy:** Rokach's claims were highly controversial, with some labeling her as anti-Zionist and accusing her of using selective evidence to vilify Israel.

44. "The Gun and the Olive Branch: The Roots of Violence in the Middle East" (1977)

- **Author:** David Hirst
- **Overview:** Hirst analyzes the Israeli-Palestinian conflict from its origins, focusing on how violence became central to the establishment and perpetuation of Israel. He critiques the Zionist movement and highlights Palestinian resistance.

45. "The General's Son: Journey of an Israeli in Palestine" (2012)

- **Author:** Miko Peled
- **Overview:** Peled, the son of an Israeli general, recounts his journey from a staunch Zionist upbringing to becoming a critic of Israel's policies and an advocate for Palestinian rights. He argues that Israel's actions against Palestinians are indefensible.
