The act of pointing a gun at the photographer can be seen as an instinctive reaction, born out of both his wartime training and his post-war paranoia.

Paranoia and the Constant Threat of Exposure

Skorzeny's reaction in this incident reflects the ever-present danger he faced as a high-profile Nazi fugitive. While living openly in Spain under Franco's protection, he remained acutely aware that his past as an SS officer and war criminal made him a target. By 1960, Mossad's capture of Adolf Eichmann had demonstrated Israel's ability to track and apprehend Nazi war criminals, no matter how secure they seemed.
