

Trump Visits Grave of Dead 'Messiah'

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On the one-year anniversary of the October 7 attack on Israel, former U.S. President Donald Trump made a symbolic visit to the gravesite of Rabbi Menachem Mendel Schneerson, known as the Rebbe, in Queens, New York. Schneerson, the late leader of the Chabad-Lubavitch movement, is viewed by many of his followers as a potential Messiah. However, in 1994, the Rebbe passed away without having publicly declared himself the Messiah or fulfilling the expected messianic prophecies. For some followers, this created a theological dilemma, but many continued to believe that Schneerson was indeed the Messiah and that his passing was part of a greater divine plan. They maintain that the Rebbe will return to complete his messianic mission, drawing parallels to the idea of resurrection and return that exists in some streams of Jewish thought. This belief persists among certain factions of the Chabad movement, who continue to pray for his return and refer to him as the living *Moshiach*.

The Rebbe's Legacy

After Rabbi Schneerson's passing, the Ohel, his burial site in Queens, New York, became a pilgrimage destination for his followers and many others seeking spiritual connection. The Ohel is more than a gravesite; it is viewed as a sacred place where prayers are believed to reach God more directly through the intercession of the Rebbe. Visitors to the Ohel typically leave written notes, known as *kvitlach*, containing personal prayers or requests for divine intervention. Politicians, religious leaders, and laypeople alike consider a visit to the Ohel as a moment of deep spiritual importance, often seen as a way to receive divine wisdom or protection through the Rebbe's intercession.

This enduring legacy of the Rebbe's spiritual leadership is one of the key reasons why the Chabad movement remains a powerful force in Jewish life globally. The belief in his continued presence, coupled with the belief by some in his messianic role, gives the Rebbe a lasting influence that shapes the movement's activities and philosophy.
